The Major Time Periods (and the Caveats...)

- Medieval: 800-1400
- Renaissance: 1400-1600
- Baroque: 1600-1750
- Classic: 1750-1800
- Romantic: 1800-1920
- Modern: 1920-2020(?)

Medieval: 800-1400

Monophony and then Polyphony

Major Genres:

Gregorian Chant, Organum, Motet, Mass

Major Composers:

Anonymous, Perotin, Machaut

Don't even get me started on...

Forme fixe, music theory, notation



Renaissance: 1400-1600 Music becomes ART

Major Genres:

Masses, motets, madrigals

Major Composers:

Dufay, Josquin, Palestrina, Gabrieli, Lasso, Marenzio

Don't even get me started on...

Gesualdo, parody/cantus firmus, canzonas



Baroque: 1600-1750

Rise of Secular/Instrumental Music

Major Genres:

Opera, Concerto, Sonata

Major Composers:

Monteverdi, Corelli, Vivaldi, Bach, Handel



Don't even get me started on...

Late madrigals, French Opera/Lully, castrati

Classic: 1750-1800 Balance & Symmetry

Major Genres:

Symphony, String Quartet, Opera, Piano Sonata

Major Composers:

Haydn, Mozart, Beethoven

Don't even get me started on...

Early Classic, the movie *Amadeus*, all the humor of Haydn



Romantic: 1800-1920

Expression & The Middle Class Joins In

Major Genres:

Symphony, Opera, Character Piece, Art Song, Showpieces, Impressionism, Nationalism

Major Composers:

Schubert, Schumann, <u>Brahms</u>, <u>Wagner</u>, <u>Mahler</u>, Verdi, Puccini, Tchaikovsky, Chopin, Rimsky-Korsakov, <u>Debussy</u>, Mendelssohn, etc.

Don't even get me started on...

All the other composers, Brahms vs. Wagner, late Romanticism, etc.

Modern: 1920-2020(?) Music for the Elite?

Major Genres:

Ballet, Opera, "formless" works, atonality



Major Composers:

Stravinsky, Copland, Bernstein, Schönberg, Shostakovich, Cage, Williams, etc.

Don't even get me started on...

Classical & Pop/Jazz/Ragtime/Rock, Avant-garde, serialism, when the period ends

What we did NOT cover (yet):
